

Faculty Pivot to Online Teaching

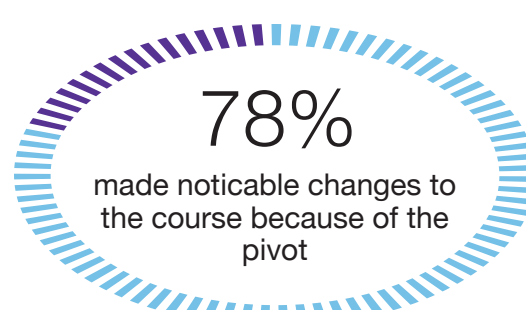
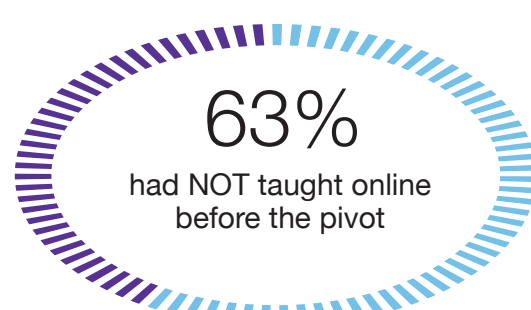

22 of 25 B.C. post-secondary institutions represented



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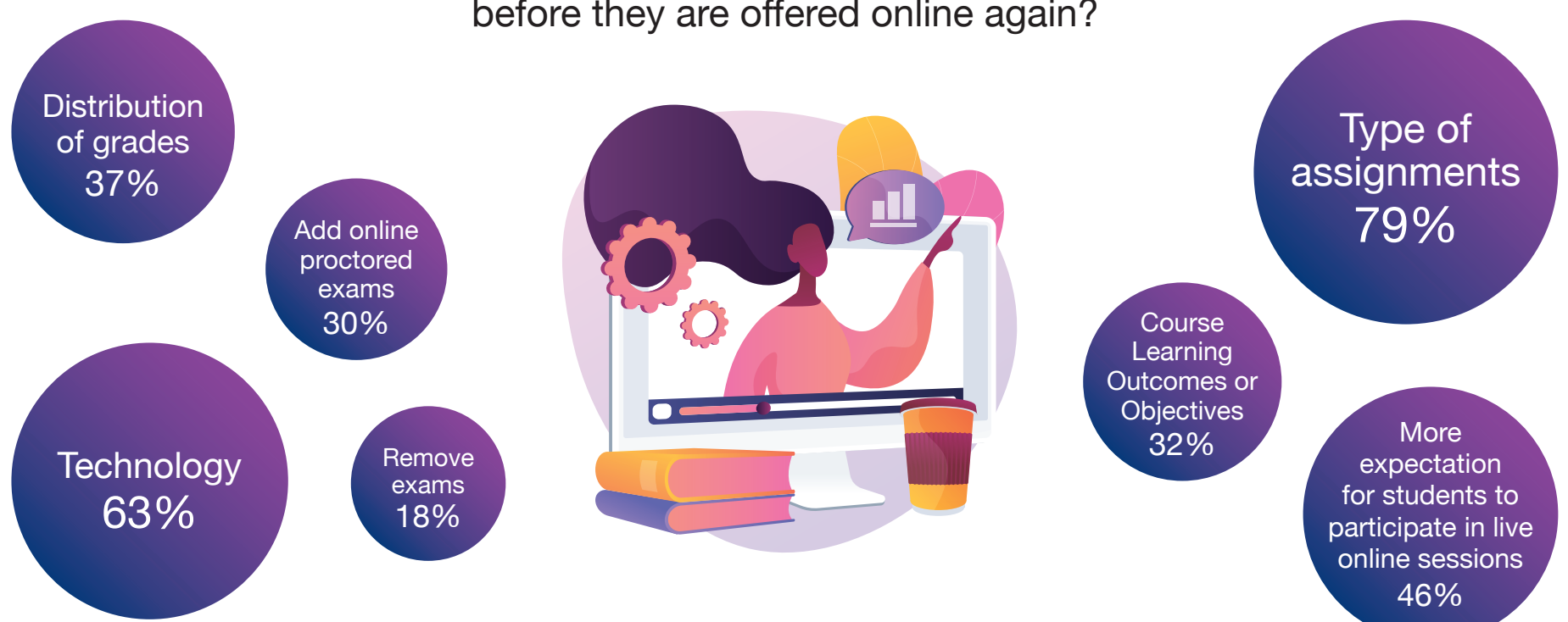

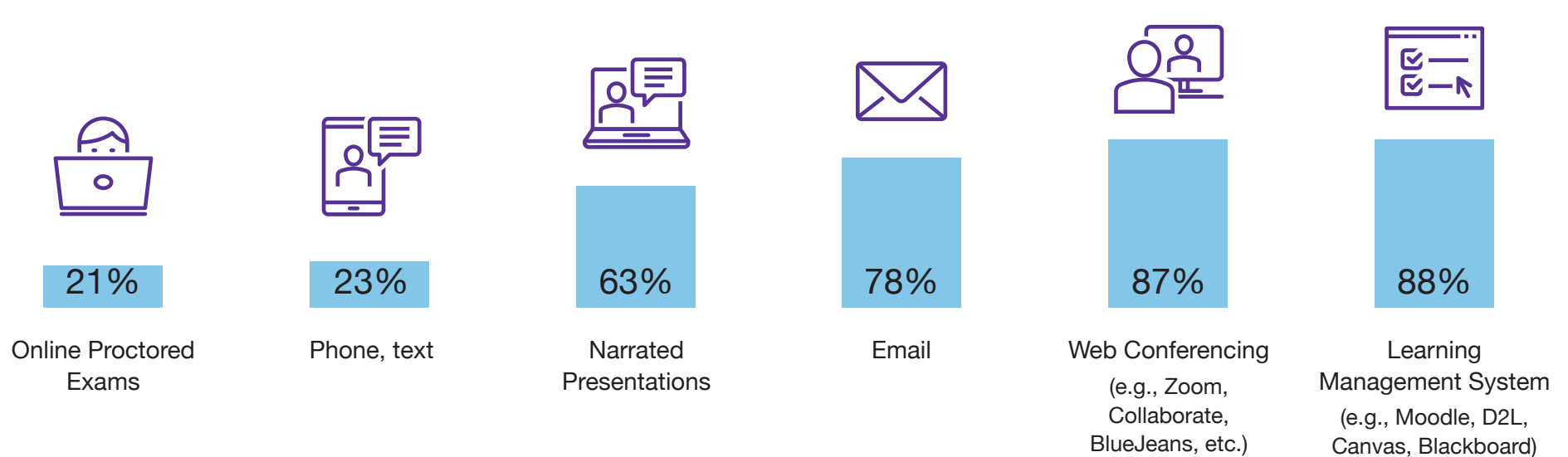
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Moving Forward (12-18 months)
