



Recognition and Intentions



- We recognize that we do not identify as Indigenous, we do not have people on our team who identify as Indigenous, and we are not experts.
- Our intent is to share lessons we have learned as we embarked on a process to strengthen our commitment to reconciliation.
- Through the process we worked with Kathi Camilleri, an Indigenous facilitator, who we have worked with for almost a decade. Kathi draws on Indigenous knowledge and ways of being in her work.





The Context

- The CYC program prepares students to work with children, youth, families and communities facing complex challenges.
- Educators and practitioners in the field of Child and Youth Care (CYC) are actively interrogating the ways in which CYC curriculum, pedagogy and practice are implicated in ongoing colonialism and working to decolonize CYC education and practice (Louiselle et. al., 2012; White et. al., 2017; Yoon, 2012).
- Our team is deeply committed to this work as we are aiming to build on our history and knowledge of Indigenous approaches and strengthen our commitment to social justice, decolonization, and indigenization within our program.



Current Efforts

- Increasing the voices of Indigenous scholars and artists into classes.
- Developing assignments with an Indigenous focus.
- Strengthening curriculum in relation to social justice and anti-racism.
- Integrating trauma informed principles into teaching.
- Offering The Village and Kairos Blanket experiential learning exercises to students.
- Contact and Colonization Course
- Elders in Classes
- Elders Teachings





The Need

• What was missing in our efforts was the opportunity for the team to engage in a decolonial process of meaningful dialogue to co-create and articulate a decolonial approach to practice for our program.





The Purpose

Consistent with Indigenous principles of relationality, experiential learning, and values (Antoine, et. al., 2018; Baskin, 2011; Canadian Council on Learning, 2007; Little Bear, 2009) our purpose in this project was to come together as a team to articulate our collective decolonial approach to practice and shared values that will ground us in our work.

Elements of the Process that facilitated our work

- Dedicated Time honored commitment
- Created space for genuine dialogue
- Humility
- "Open hearts and open minds" (Kathi Camilleri)
- Emergent and co-created rather than hierarchical
- Grounded in values
- Trauma Informed
- Informed by Indigenous ways of knowing and lessons from Elders.






Outcomes of the Process Team Debrief

- More hopeful and optimistic about what is possible
- More connected
- More cohesion amongst group and vision embedded into program rather than siloed within individual faculty and courses.
- More clearly seeing our strengths and potential
- More committed
- Greater clarity on moving forward collectively






CYC Program Vision - Highlights

- Individual and collective commitment.



Lessons Learned

Chris Camilleri, Artist

- View the journey as a process that requires ongoing commitment and time.
- Take responsibility individual and collective.
- Work with Indigenous facilitators, leaders and communities.
- Create space for an emergent, co-created ongoing process.
- Identify your collective values and enact these values day-to-day.
- Be trauma informed
- Be humble, listen and learn.
- Let go of what is not working and cultivate what is.
- Recognize the actions that you can take and take them!
