Defining Collaboration

Collaboration is...

- Working with someone to produce a shared outcome;
- Efforts from various parties focused on achieving a common purpose

Features:

- Focuses on efforts that are active
- Suggests a consistent effort by the parties
- MOU is the starting point, not the goal



Key Values

- We work to serve our community
- The best ideas are shaped together
- Our best work emerges when we know our 'why'
- We persist through the 'how'
- Know your strengths and operate within them
- We are always learning and growing

Best Practices

- 1. Start with the purpose: know our own, and shared, aims
- 2. Build an agreement that reflects and supports shared aims
- 3. Start and persist with inquiry
- 4. Project management is key: regular and open comms, shared file storage, assigned responsibility, deliverables, timelines, etc.
- 5. Celebrate the wins together

The Collaboration Framework

A Pilot Project funded by PSFS

Key Questions:

- How can we share content we've developed with other institutions? Why don't we typically want to do this?
- What avenues are currently available? Where are the gaps?
- How we can leverage our strengths as training institutions to help make BC residents better equipped with the training they need, where and when they need it?

Purpose:

- To take thoughtful, industryaligned, high-quality curriculum that addresses labour market needs and make it available across all regions in the province
- To incentivize institutions to want to share content that is ready for delivery
- To sustainably scale the framework by streamlining process and establishing equitable access
- To decrease redundant investments by the institutions and province

Structure:

- Central content repository
- Common licensing agreement
- Each institution can contribute
- Developed educational products, immediately available
- Licensing fee is 4% of gross tuition (after add/drop)
- Institutions can use revenue to maintain content and/or fuel new developments

Features:

- Greatly diminishes redundant efforts across the sector
- Leverages developmental expertise and regional delivery across the entire sector
- Motivates institutions to contribute new offerings
- Learners across BC gain access to new / labour market focused training in their region

Next Steps for the Pilot:

- Engaging 2 public PSIs
- Inviting input on framework and draft licensing agreement
- Share VCC micro-cred content via the repository
- Summative report including lessons learned and recommendations
